

Sermon for May 10, 2020 This week was the one year anniversary of the death of Rachel Held Evans. Maybe you never heard of Rachel, but she was a writer. A Christian writer. She died May 4 2019 from a serious reaction to an infection, and to the medicine used to fight that infection. She was 37. It was a tragedy. To her family, 2 little children, and a spouse, to her friends, and to her readers. Rachel was a writer that I read a bit of before her death, but began to read more in this year since she died so tragically. And her story speaks to me. Rachel was a southern girl, raised in an evangelical home where the pastors are men and the questions asked of scripture and of God are strictly confined to the appropriate questions. But, Rachel was smart as a whip, and when she began to have those questions that nearly all Christians come to in their lives why does God approve of all those massacres in the old testament? Why does the Bible come down so hard on people who are different - depending on where you read - women who cut their long hair, men who grow their short hair, and people in unnatural sexual relationships? And with her questions she began to dig, and came to conversations with theologians and housewives that changed her perspective. God is a God of love, Rachel writes. "...faith isn't about having everything figured out ahead of time; faith is about following the quiet voice of God without having everything figured out ahead of time."

Conversations matter. Between Christians, as Rachel Held Evans tells us, and with Jesus, as we find him in John's gospel, has a long history of conversations with many people. He talks with Nicodemus about being born again, with the woman at the well about what mountain God is worshipped upon. But with his disciples, and in particular in the evening just before he was arrested and the day before he was crucified, Jesus has conversations with those disciples about faith, about heaven, about the meaning of life. And then he talks about many dwelling places. I've read this gospel passage from John 14 at many memorial and graveside services. It's a comforting passage. "I go to prepare a place for you" Jesus says, and then later, in v 3, And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also" You got that right, Jesus says he's coming back to get you - you're not journeying to the place for you alone. But, as comforting as Jesus' words about preparing a place for us, and that we won't be alone are, there is something more going on here in the conversation. Jesus is sharing power. With the disciples. With us. Really. The passage I want to look at is rarely preached, at least I haven't heard it much, because, well, you'll see. Here's what he says, Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

It looks pretty clear to me that Jesus is empowering the disciples, and by extension us – you and me. But I do not read these words as extending some magic to us, no I think Rachel Held Evans understood this passage better than I –

"We could not become like God, so God became like us. God showed us how to heal instead of kill, how to mend instead of destroy, how to love instead of hate, how to live instead of long for more. When we nailed God to a tree, God forgave. And when we buried God in the ground, God got up."

I see Jesus empowering the disciples. By conversation. By reminding them of his time with them. God became one of us and modeled for us a life of love – and included in that is the realization that we have power as the people of God. This love we know so well from Jesus' table is the only power we need to change the world. The phrase that Rachel uses that touches me in this time of pandemic is this – **How to live instead of long for more**. I am praying God is showing you that in these days where the rhythm of life has been disrupted and you have the option of drawing near to the love of God in the every day. Be like Rachel, my friends. Let us draw near to God, and be like God. Together. Amen. Blessings – Pastor Patricia+
