News and Information about Holy Cross and Covid-19 June 16, 2020

This week at Holy Cross, we are convening a task force to plan reopening. That's pretty exciting. And arduous. That group will be coming to terms with several important factors –

Government guidelines are meant to help us plan to safely reopen, but of course the conversation is should we reopen? There are members of our church family who will choose not to attend worship once we reopen, due to valid concerns about their own health and safety. The CDC has repeatedly classified people over 65 and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions separately, and suggested these people make decisions about going out of the house with more care and thought.

But, should we wait to reopen to in person worship dependent upon the most vulnerable among us? Well, friends, it seems true that people have always self-excluded for worship. I would personally rather have people at church who want to be there than anyone who feels forced! But, of course, the church should not reopen capriciously just because they can! So, our task force is designed to address needs of: sanitizing the facility, minimizing opportunities for the spread of the virus, and proscribing such changes to the furnishing that will accomplish those goals. We have another group redesigning the worship service taking into account the recommendations to suspend congregational singing and responsive readings, as well as social distancing within the worship space. Holy Communion, an intrinsic part of our worship must also be redesigned with an emphasis on safety.

Holy Cross offers use of its space to many and diverse groups, also, and, as a good host, must offer rules and expect compliance on these rules by our partners in ministry. Lots of details.

So, while those groups are working (call Bryan Struve or the office to volunteer), we will continue to worship as we have – with mailed worship services and sermon copies, etc, and youtube recorded elements of worship (sermons, readings, prayers, music) offered on both the website (<a href="www.holycrosslutheran-salem.org">www.holycrosslutheran-salem.org</a>) and the Facebook Page – Holy Cross Lutheran-Salem. Even after we 'open' for in person worship, those elements will continue, at least for awhile. If you have thoughts about this plan, won't you share them with Bryan Struve or the Pastor?

**Communion Blessing** The body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen you and keep you in His grace. **Amen** 


## **COMMUNION BLESSING**

## **BLESSING**



Sermon for June 14, 2020 And Sarah laughed within herself. This is Genesis 18:12. The translation from the Hebrew for me, the word is best translated within her belly. 3 holy individuals, have come to the tents where Abraham and Sarah are living. They are probably in their 90s. God spoke to Abraham nearly 30 years earlier, telling him that he would make of him a great nation. these two follow God's commands, and make the journey to the place God has sent them. The family, the children they were expecting God to bless them with have never materialized. Sarah swallows her pride and her self worth and gives Abraham her maid, Hagar, and they have a child together, Ishmael. It looks like they've solved that problem, when the 3 holy personages show up and say, when we're back here next year, Sarah will have borne you a son. And Sarah laughed within herself. God had made them a promise, which appeared to be incomplete. Sarah was left out of the promise - God would make of them a great nation, and all nations would be blessed through them, but Sarah had been sidelined in that promise. And so she laughs within herself. This summer, We're going to start in Genesis to look at the narratives from the very beginning of the bible that a lot of you remember. The Abraham story begins 2000 years before Christ is born, before the pharaohs, 1500 years before Alexander the great unites much of the area. But the search for significance is real, and alive in the men and women of the region. Scratching out a living from a largely barren land will dominate much of the search for significance in these years. Creating a family that will live on after us is key. When the creator of the universe offers you a legacy - a family and the opportunity to bless all nations, it must have exceeded all dreams they ever had. They begin to follow God's lead, stumbling so many times, but here at the Oaks of Mamre they entertain 3 holy individuals, , and the ancient demands of kindness to strangers are strong here. Abraham fetches and bows, and asks Sarah to prepare cakes, and they roll out the red carpet for the 3. Then there is a moment, an acknowledgment of Abraham and Sarah and their life of following the Lord. "I will surely return to you I due season, and your wife Sarah shall bear a son". And Sarah laughs. It seems to me there was pain in that laugh. She laughs, because she and her husband are old now, it seems silly to expect a child now - but the visitor says, Is anything too wonderful for the lord? Even when we feel dismissed, like Sarah did, even when we feel that history is being written around us, God can be with us in our emptiness, and bless us. Now let's move the timeline forward 2000 years to the time of Jesus. 9:35 Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus the son of God is in the world, bearing what the people need in that place and time. They are harassed and helpless. He is curing every disease and every sickness. Again we see that the God of love attempts to meet people where they are in their search for significance. As long as hunger and disease stalk the land, no one is at peace, no one can find significance. And so Jesus sends his disciples out to continue the work he has begun. Move your timeline forward another 2000 years, my friends, and you will find the times we live in now. The search for significance continues. We strive to find meaning even when we are isolated from each other in the hopes of preventing disease. We strive to find meaning as we march for the rights of the marginalized. We strive to find meaning as we cook dinner, raise children, and earn a living. We strive to find meaning in our advanced years, when it seems like no one needs us, that we are more like an afterthought in the history of the world. My friends, God hears your desire for significance, God honors your search for significance - whether you are a nomad like Abraham, a disciple of Jesus or a senior citizen still capable of helping others. We will talk about this search for significance this summer, friends, because God honors it, honors you. You can find significance as you work for the worth of each person as we come to terms with systemic racism in our world. You can find significance as you extend yourself for people whose jobs have disappeared. You can find significance as you imagine what God is calling Holy cross to do and to be in this emerging reality. Pray. Serve. Expect God to do great things. Amen.
