When we gather in our garden again for worship on **August 23**rd, we will take time to thank God for each of them, and for the gifts of stewardship this congregation has enjoyed. I am grateful.

Holy Cross' giving is again visible in our movement to **gather school supplies** for the next year (we don't know everything about how school will happen, but we know there will be supplies needed and we want to be ready!). Please consider dropping some by the church on **Tues – Thursday during office hours** or at our Patio Worship on August 23rd at 10 am.

As your pastor, I am pleased to say that I am being allowed onto some of our folks' patios for visiting (care facilities, too) where that was unadvised until recently. Let me know if you or someone you know needs a visit!

A sermon for August 9, 2020 In life there are peaks and there are valleys. Wouldn't you agree? There are mountaintop experiences, high points, where we feel God's love and almost feel the hand of God lifting us up into the heavens - maybe it's a great worship experience, maybe it's a wonderful family time, but it's a high. And then there are low points, where we look around and say, Where is God when these awful things happen to me? We feel low because of illness, or loss, and so I ask you, Where Is God in each of these instances, the peaks and the valleys? Well, let's look at that gospel reading, God is there in the details, the feeding of the 5000 has just happened, a miracle, and then Jesus goes away to pray and the men go out in the boat, and suddenly there is Jesus walking on water, and Peter asks him to command him to walk out there too, and its blissful, until Peter loses heart, and begins sinking. Jesus scoops him up, of course - peaks and valleys in this life we life. But the story in Genesis for today which begins this is the story of the family of Jacob - there's some big peaks and valleys. Last week Jacob finally coming to terms with God, as they wrestle, and showing some real personal growth. here he is with 11 of his sons, and he is showing favoritism to Joseph, not the eldest, but the son of the wife he loved. Joseph has picked up this thread and begins to tattle on his brothers to daddy. And then, he has dreams where he is the star, and all his brothers bow down to him. And he tells the brothers this. He thinks he is pretty cool. We have a peak for Joseph, and Jacob too. All is well. But not for the other brothers. They are in a valley, of jealousy - feeling unloved by their father. And so, they take steps. They are out working, and Joseph has to go a long way about 20 miles to find them in a place he doesn't know. And the brothers are not happy to see him, and they throw him in a pit. (Do you see the peaks and the valleys?) Things are bad for him, but they are about to be worse, as the brothers chat about killing him, but decide to sell him instead, and tell their father a lie about him being killed. Big valley for Joseph, big Valley for Jacob, something of a peak for the other boys - yay, the snitch is gone, but you know, friends that kind of peak doesn't really feel very good. Next week, we'll pick up the story at the end, for Joseph. So, we stop today here - in this deep valley. Joseph and of course his father has been treated very unjustly. the brothers were treated pretty unjustly for quite a while as their father made one of them an obvious favorite and showed him more love than the others. So, I bring you today to this visual of a family, struggling with peaks and valleys. Just like Peter did that day with Jesus. Just like you and I are experiencing today. It's a good time to talk about God's role in the peaks and valleys in our life. Jesus is clearly a redeemer in the Peter story - rescuing him from Peter's own fears, and pointing them out at the same time. How is God calling us to be redeemers in the stories we find ourselves in right now? I think a way God acts in the world, is to call us to seek to do Justice. To be able to recognize injustice when we see it, as in the Joseph epic. Next week, we will resolve the Joseph story, but today, all is unsettled. Wrong has been done and no angel has swooped down to stop it. I feel that about the pandemic around us. How long, o lord, must we suffer? And, a lot of us are just inconvenienced, not really suffering, but we keep seeing and hearing about others suffering mightily - death, loss of income, loss of health, loss of jobs. This 'at a distance' suffering can be unsettling in its own way. Loss and guilt. Why does a just God allow this? And what am I supposed to do about it? What are your thoughts about our 'at a distance' suffering when we see and hear about horrific suffering - the indignities visited upon people of color for hundreds of years, the inequalities we see in neighborhoods where latinos or immigrants are in the majority? I think These epic sagas of redemption point us toward action. I point you to Reuben's role in this story Reuben uses his influence to persuade his brothers not to kill Joseph, but just to throw him in a pit. text says Reuben was planning to rescue him later. But no the caravan passes and Judah sees an opportunity, too - to sell Joseph, get rid of him, and make a few bucks. how often have we been Reuben, well intentioned, but part of the problem. A moment came, where he could have stepped up. He missed it. What is God calling churches, and church people to be about in these days of fear and isolation? Surely we are to be on the side of comfort and care. How can we, a small church in a small neighborhood be part of direct action in our time? I think that's the question for today. How is God calling you, and me to be redeemers? Amen - Blessings to you, Pastor Patricia+
