
#### September 15, 2020

NO worship in the Patio this week – INSTEAD – PATIO WORSHIP/PARKING LOT WORSHIP WILL BE HELD SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 27<sup>TH</sup> AT 10 AM! Air quality is the reason for this delay. Thank you for understanding!

I hope you are all safe, and I want to know how you are all doing. Please call, text or email me and let me know. Soon, ok? I'd like to just assume 'No news is good news" but I think that's foolhardy.



I include this quote from Mary Oliver today, one of my favorite poets. I am so glad to know you all, my friends. My prayers are with you all.

Some of you may be like me – a little too German sometimes wishing I were young and strong and could go hand out water to firefighters or work with the crews in Mill City who dug firelines with tractors. But I'm not quite that able bodied. Maybe that's true for you. Please know that you still have something to contribute - prayers, certainly, money, surely. We are a few blocks at Holy Cross from one of the largest evacuation centers in Oregon. They are handling things well there.

And more arrive every day from around our nation and our globe. <u>Thank you, God</u> We have mapping and communication technology our grandparents could never have dreamed of <u>Thank you, God</u>

The dry east winds are over, and with that the worst fire weather conditions are done.

Marine air will be gradually working inland next few days, pushing the worst of the smoke out. Thank you, God

And chances for rain return early next week. Thank you, God

God hears the cries of all who call out in need,

guided by the example of the same Jesus Christ

### Sermon for September 13, 2020 - God's Work, Our Hands, Sunday.

Well, Oregon is burning right now. As of this recording, I hear that 10 percent of our whole population is evacuated, and many many more are waiting for news to evacuate at a moments notice. I bet you've been praying a lot lately. I know I have. And praying can calm our hearts, and help us process. I think that's really important. None of us are very good at stressful situations, but until we can find that calm center within us that clings to God, I am afraid we make stressful situations even worse with our anxiety and fear. That's true in so many areas of life. It's true with this Coronavirus epidemic we are experiencing. It's true in interpersonal relationships.

I have been preaching on the old testament all summer, but this week, I Really want to talk about the gospel of Matthew. Its one of the hard stories (we recorded the readings separately, so stop this recording, and watch that first, will you? Or turn to Matthew 18:21-35 and read it over.

This passage is about Peter asking a question of Jesus, and he tells him a parable about forgiveness. Peter is a person who struggles with his own self importance, and Jesus speaks an important truth to him. The parable is about a man whose king forgives a huge debt that he had – so huge he would never have been able to repay it. The man is happy, and relieved, I am sure. But then, that man comes across someone who owes him money, and he doesn't forgive, he ruthlessly condemns that person. Eventually the king finds out and punishes the first slave severely, because he doesn't pass on the forgiveness he received. Well, this is something we need to hear right now. Because I think we all have awareness of Gods' forgiveness of our sins. But, maybe in our heart of heart we never really feel worthy of that forgiveness so we cannot embody forgiveness, offering it to others. Do you ever see this happening? I do. I see it when I get testy with my neighbors over small things. I see it when the church attempts to find a new identity, offering love and compassion in new ways, but folks get tied up with the minutiae of life – and the new ways never really come about because of it.

Have you ever wondered why some folks or some organizations are able to do great things? I have. And one characteristic I see that they share is that they are able to hold themselves, lightly. To know just how sinful and messed up they are, but to feel how much God loves them. That makes you feel light doesn't it? Like a burden is lifted? And then when complications come along, or worries and stress, those folks are able to let them roll off their back. No sweat. And the mission and ministry goes on. Don't you think that relaxing, unclenching, and letting God's love wash over you is the place to start? You really can do that. You have God's permission. You have my permission. God is love, and the worst person you know you are in your heart is nothing like what God sees. God sees your clean, and holy self, the one God created, and the One God adores. <sup>21</sup>Peter came and said to [Jesus], "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" <sup>22</sup>Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. And this is the part I would add – and God forgives you 7 times more than even that. Or 77 times more than even that. Feel that forgiveness of God today, friends, won't you? That's the part that changes things in this world.

So, as you get out there ready to change the world, with your gifts, with your work, with your talent, please know – you are released to do this, released to change the world. Its not a burden, its not something you really need to 'get right'. Just breathe. Rest in God's embrace of forgiveness and the opportunity to work for God to change the world will be right there. You'll be like Moses with his staff, who, when he relaxes, and trusts in God, can part the red sea and save his people. That's you. That's us. Start. By Breathing In God's Love. Amen.
