Sermon for Sunday Sept 6, 2020 Liturgy is the order of a worship service. Liturgy is not a word you're going to use in a lot of everyday conversations, but when you and I, gather together in a communal way, we lean on a liturgy to show us the way. Even in this time of adaptations during a pandemic, we lean on the liturgy. We have a time of confession and forgiveness, then we often have a song or two to draw us in, to sanctify the space, to remind us all, as we pray together, Lord, have mercy. Our reading today from Exodus is all about Liturgy. And since I didn't get to preach to you last week, let me just frame our discussion a bit -book of Exodus, the story of the family of God in this time, the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, who have settled in Goshen, a part of Egypt, where they started as friendly neighbors but are now in a full blown war with the Pharaoh - the king of Egypt- who has declared genocide against the Hebrew people, because he fears their numbers. A deliverer, Moses, Has been raised up from the Hebrews, called by God in a holy fire, and sent to demand that Pharaoh let my people Go. And Pharaoh refuses. God sends plagues to break him, but Pharaoh will not give in. So his people endure frogs, and bugs and the river turned to blood, they endure a horrible plague of skin ulcers and more. And now, finally, God sends the angel of death to kill the firstborn in every home that does not declare God as Lord by taking a hyssop branch and marking the door frame with the blood of a blemish free lamb or goat which is then roasted, and eaten by the family gathered, with their sandals on their feet and their belt cinched around their waist ready to move at God's command. It's a battlefield. It's a battle of wills. And God prepares the people by giving them liturgy - mark the doorposts just so - choose the perfect animal for dinner just so - roast the animal in this way. But, pull that telescope we are using to watch this story, back, and you will see that this liturgy for preparing the Passover meal is not a liturgy for a one-time meal on the eve of battle. It is the liturgy for an entire nation, an entire people, an entire way of life. The Passover is the seminal event for people of the book - for Jews, and for Christians alike. The reading in Exodus urges families to join together to share a lamb or goat if their family cannot consume a whole animal. The reading tells us how to prepare it - they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. This Passover shall be a perpetual ordinance - something to be done in memory of this event in history forever. I have a lovely memory in my heart of sharing the Passover meal with our last confirmation class and their families. Talking about the bitter herbs, and the traditions that Jewish families today use to remember this even from nearly 4000 years ago was a pivotal piece of their learning. Because Jesus celebrates the Passover also, with his friends on that night before he was killed. The Passover shall be a perpetual ordinance. God gives us a liturgy, a pattern, a plan a communal way to draw closer to God. Jesus shows us this plan still holds up, as he meets in the upper room that Maundy Thursday. And so must we, as we meet in these days of war - against a common enemy - illness and death from covid 19. We lean into the liturgy - a well known and heartful drawing near to God in prayer, in music, in togetherness. Togetherness is the hard part isn't it? I just came back from seeing family we had been unable to visit for so long - a little granddaughter I had never seen who turned 1 year old while I was with her. And her mother is a doctor, and so we smiled at each other, and giggled, and played, and yet, I never held her, nor touched her. It was important you see, for me to protect her life, and, for her family, to protect our lives. But we spent a happy day hiking together, me giggling at her in the backpack. We saw more family - 3 little boys all growing up so tall. We played games, and sat around a campfire, and we prayed before meals. We were together. And I call my uncle Charles every 2 weeks or so and talk about his chemo, and the paralysis he has now, and he is so happy to be on our prayer chain. We are together. These are the family I have Passover with in my heart. And then there is all of you, and our connection, and of course, connections you have with each other, and your neighbors, and your community. God gave us a liturgy - a pattern of living to include all the world, our whole communityin these behaviors, and prayers and rituals that bind us together - against the current threat. God is good. And we are together. Today's Gospel makes that point so well That reading ends -For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them. Your job and mine in these days my friends is to gather - and to find new ways to gather - on the phone, in letters, on zoom - and to care for all in the name of Jesus Christ who binds us together.
