Today is my grandmother's birthday. She was born in 1915 and died in 1964. She was a great lady, at least from a 5-year-old perspective. She had a heart for giving and sharing, there was always room at the table for anyone who came to the door. She always made me my own batch of cookies when she baked because I did not like nuts in anything and everyone else did. Maybe it was a ploy on my part to get more cookies but somehow, I always had the opportunity to share with someone.

Those early years of guidance and being treated special have been a huge contributor to how I view the world and in this year of chaos from many directions there have been many opportunities to carry them forward. I have viewed Holy Cross Lutheran Church as a giving, sharing, supporting and I could go on forever with similar descriptions. We have recently had the opportunity to provide those things to 2 families affected by the recent wildfires.

The families are staying in the church parking lot on the east side of the church building. The Aho/Bean family is staying in a small 5th wheel trailer with 2 adults and 2 children. They have been in contact with Family Promise and hopefully will be assisted by that program to find larger more permanent housing. Jennifer works at Applebee's on Commercial and the Parkway and Mike stays home with Orien and Lily.

Annie and Joseph (Jay) Wilson are in a motorhome that they drove up to Oregon from Texas to take a position in an RV park east of Clackamas, I don't think they have been in Oregon more than 2 months. They were first evacuated to Clackamas somewhere and within a couple of days were sent to the State Fairgrounds. During the evacuations process they have had a car stolen and the electrical system in the motorhome has been blown, luckily no fire to the vehicle itself. Since locating to Holy Cross they have had their cell phone stolen – hopefully, that is the last thing that is negative, and they can begin a healing process. They are working on getting estimates for repairs and then start working on a plan for their future. It will be a long and arduous process for them. Jay is applying for jobs locally to fill a gap until January when he will begin a job with the Attorney Generals office here in Salem.

As a congregation we are supporting with the space to park their HOMES, electricity, and water. Many individuals and small groups have coordinated food, showers, laundry money and freezer space. Annie and Joe do not have refrigeration so food storage is difficult for them.

Both families are very nice, respectful and grateful. Please pray for each family and wave when you see them out in the parking area. Covid says we should keep a distance even – especially when we want to literally run up and wrap our arms around them to comfort and support.

Thank you to Gary Bogstad, Loran & Peggy Sell, Kathy and Jerry Barker, Bryan Struve, Pastor and Janet. You have all been great. Moral support, cleaning, sharing money for laundry, gathering food, getting better cords for running electricity to the RVs, coordinating repair contacts and information, printing resource information sheets to share with the families and the list goes on.....

I would also like to share with you what connections Holy Cross has gained through this as well. We are now linked the Salem Leadership Foundation (SLF), to Safe Parking, which is an off shoot of Church At The Park. John Marshall is the person in charge of Safe Parking and he has been very helpful. DJ Vincent from SLF/Church At The Park has been connecting us to United Way with a possible donated replacement RV for the Wilson's if theirs is not repairable.

Please keep the families in your thoughts and prayers. Also for MY anchors from Holy Cross – Bryan, Gary, Loran, Peggy, Kathy, Jerry, Pastor and Janet. And watch for further updates and possibly requests for donations.

From an extremely grateful person, excited with the new opportunity God has provided for us to learn and grow.

The Frightened People of God - Sermon Oct 11, 2020 Moses is up on the mountaintop communing with God, and the people, the Hebrews are left at the foot of Mt. Sinai. They are worried, they are stressed, they are confused. They have been told they must not even touch the mountain, it is so holy, and so they wait, cut off from the only information stream they have - Moses - to find out what's next for them. They've escaped slavery in Egypt only to find no food or water available, until the all powerful God sends them water from the rock, and manna quails. The fear they carry is palpable. I cannot help but compare how they felt those 4000 years ago, to how we feel today in the days of Covid-19, when people are sick and dying, and some are spreading misinformation and fear, so many have lost livelihoods, and there is no end in sight. That mountain the Hebrews can't touch? It dominates the landscape and yet they can't go there. This disease dominates our life, our conversations, and our choices, and yet, we have no concrete idea of how we will get through this time, and who will sicken, and possibly die in the process. Do you feel differently for the Hebrews now? They're not so bad. They are frightened. Moses and God are having a very high level meeting (there's a pun in there). It feels like God is playing favorites. If God loves all the children of Israel, the Hebrews, why is God treating the people differently? And the results are not good. While Moses and God are talking on the mountain, the people turn to Aaron, Moses' brother who speaks so well, the man who will be the founder of the Priests of Israel, and they complain. Moses has been gone 40 days speaking with God before he returns with the commandments. That's a long time. The people are frightened, they are confused, and they decide to come up with their own plan for worshipping God. Remember when I told you that this journey in Exodus is about changing the Hebrews from being slaves in Egypt for hundreds of years, to being people dedicated to God, with a vision for creating a nation to honor their Lord. That's a long journey to make metaphorically. A journey that will take 40 years in the desert. That said, I am not crazy about the way God treats them - like unruly children - don't touch this, wait and I'll tell you what I want you to know - it feels like rough parenting sometimes. So, let's look at how the Hebrews react - they have been fed at God's hand, and guided by God's man Moses, but they yearn for God to show up in their lives - That's what I think, because they Ask Aaron to make gods for them. They are beginning to wonder if God is really there for them - its been a hard journey, and now a hard time of waiting. So Aaron wants to comfort them. Why not make a few gods out of the gold they got in Egypt during their years of slavery? If it will give them (and him) some peace? But you know how that ends. God is angry, and Moses pleads their case. And this is the part I like best in our reading, Moses implores God, "turn from your fierce wrath, change your mind and do not bring disaster on your people. Remember Abraham, Isaac and Israel, your servants, how you swore to them by your own self, saying to them, I will multiply your descendants like the stars of heaven, and all this land that I have promised I will give to your descendants and they shall inherit it forever." And the Lord changed his mind. Moses has been pretty frustrated with these Hebrews for a while now - but all those troubles are forgotten as Moses pleads his case with God. God, remember your people. Moses. Moses has reason to be frightened too, he did not live in slavery all his life, raised in the palace, and then hides in the desert as a sheepherder for years until God calls him. He speaks to the pharaoh and leads the people out of slavery, following God's instructions and plans the whole time. But now, now we see Moses come into his own. God has been pouring his life and his care into Moses since that moment when God was the holy fire, and called Moses to this new life of leadership. And now, at this moment, Moses becomes a leader we can be proud of. God shows real anger towards the Hebrews, and even threatens their destruction. What does Moses do? Cower and beg? No. I see Moses stand tall, offering a reason for God to change his mind. Because the Hebrews are His people - since Abraham, their ancestor hundreds of years ago, he has nurtured and raised them up. And now, they are on the cusp of a life change a new land, a new beginning, and they have screwed up big time - big enough to make God almighty angry. And Moses defends them, not on their innate goodness or anything like that - but Moses defends them because of Gods' great love for them. God's great love is here for us today, too. We worship together in different ways, our lives are upended, but God's love prevails. I think you and I could follow Moses' lead - proud, and ready to defend our fellow men and women as they try to figure out these new covid times. We can do this. Maybe things aren't going so well at each moment, but kindness is happening, caring and reaching out has been present throughout our current disaster. Look to these for your encouragement my friends, as God encourages you to find your caring center, your loving and forgiving nature. We are beloved of God, my friends. Remind yourselves of this, won't you? As you care for the beloved of God who need our help in the world around us right now. Amen. - Pastor Patricia Hughes
