

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Praise and Thanks to God!

The icon shown above is titled "The Harrowing of Hell." It is one of my favorite Easter icons depicting the resurrected Christ emerging from hell, busting down the gate (door) of hell that now lays at his feet in the form of a cross.

We contemporary Lutherans are not very familiar with iconography (that is something more familiar to our Orthodox sisters and brothers who view icons as having a living being). However, I want to share this particular image with you as it is most fitting for our reflection on this Easter and throughout the Easter season.

Having been raised and worked on a farm, I know what a harrow is. After a farmer plows the ground, the sod is turned over but it lays in large clumps. So, in order to further prepare the ground for planting, a harrow – a heavy metal frame with spikes or sharp-edged disks, is used to break up the clods and level the ground. To "harrow" means to hurt, cut, wound, lacerate; it means to make uncomfortable; distress, torment; and vex. This is what Jesus did when he descended to the dead – he harrowed hell.

In our creeds we say that Christ "descended into hell" or "descended to the dead." So, I have a question: Just what was Christ doing in hell when he was crucified, died and was buried? We don't think about this very often, but our ancestors in the faith had some thoughts. In 1 Peter 3. 18*b*-19, "He was put to death in the flesh ... in which also he went and made proclamation to the spirits in prison." Their thinking is that Jesus' descent into hell is part of the resurrection sequence where Jesus proclaimed his victory to the souls of those who had died and were in the prison of hell (or death – that is Hades ... the realm of the dead.)

The further thought here is that Jesus' descent into hell is to do battle with Satan; thus guaranteeing the deliverance of the Saints!

Blessed Martin Luther said in a 1533 sermon that Christians ought to "cling to the main point – that, through Christ, hell has been torn to pieces and devil's kingdom and power utterly destroyed." Christ has harrowed hell. And, today, hell itself groans: My power has vanished. I received one who died as mortals die, but I could not hold him. With him and through him, I lost those over which I had ruled. I had held control over the dead since the world began, and lo, he raises them all up with him! (from a Holy Saturday Orthodox liturgy).

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

NICENE CREED - With the whole church, let us confess our faith.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. Sheltering God, strengthen and sustain all who support vulnerable people across the world. Empower government agencies and international organizations that provide for refugees and migrants forced to leave their homelands. Merciful God, **receive our prayer.**

Encouraging God, you do a new thing among us. We pray for those gripped by fear and anxiety or who suffer in any way (*especially*). Send us as your healing presence to places of hunger, pain, illness, or overwhelming sorrow. Merciful God, **receive our prayer.**

Surprising God, you offer endless ways for us to delight in your grace. Give this community of faith a sense of joy and wonder in exploring new avenues of faith formation, worship, and discipleship. Merciful God, receive our prayer.

Resurrecting God, you make us alive in Christ. Thank you for blessing us with faithful witnesses who now rest in you (*especially*). Merciful God, **receive our prayer.**

We offer to you these petitions and those we carry in our hearts, trusting in your abundant and ever-present mercy. **Amen.**

OFFERING PRAYER

Living God, you gather the wolf and the lamb to feed together in your peaceable reign, and you welcome us all at your table. Reach out to us through this meal, and show us your wounded and risen body, that we may be nourished and believe in Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

+ GREAT THANKSGIVING

When our congregation gathered for the celebration of Holy Communion, we heard again the story of God's mighty acts and of the love shown us in the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

With thanksgiving we remembered that "in the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Again, after supper, he took the cup gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me."

The people of our congregation were given assurance of our Lord's presence through the gift of his Holy Spirit. Now we bring to you this same bread of life and this same cup of blessing, that you may be strengthened through your participation in the body of Christ.

Jesus said, "I am the bread of life, whoever comes to me shall never hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst."

At this time, you may remember the gift of holy communion with your own bread and cup.

The body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen you and keep you in His grace. Amen
